# MUSEUM REMODELING PROJECT COMPLETE





If you have visited the museum during the past month, you cannot help but witness some of the physical changes happening here. While most the remodeling has been completed, at this point, some flooring and painting are still on the docket. The west and north walls of the library were taken down and the space will be used for a revamped version of the railroad exhibit. This has opened the exhibit hall with spectacular results. The exhibit hall is now 80 feet in length. The photo to the left was taken in the former library looking back into the exhibit hall. The photo on the right shows what was once the Byron Chamber of Commerce, and is now the Byron Museum's offices. This scene was once a hallway with a wall in the middle of this room and now it is our entrance foyer: wall-free.

# LUCIUS READ'S HEADSTONE RESTORED

The Byron Cemetery was recently a hotbed of activity. A few months ago, it was discovered by Chet and Shirley Kobel, who are instrumental in the Byron cemetery revitalization project, that Lucius Read's tombstone was broken into a number of different pieces, and fallen off its base. The museum was able to take a rubbing of the original and used this rubbing to make a replica. There are only two differences between the old tombstone and the replica: the old stone was only 1.5 inches thick, while the new one is 2.5 inches thick and the replica is made out of a more durable granite. The Museum plans to display the original headstone as part of its Read Family exhibit in the Read House.
