BYRON BUSINESS EXHIBIT OPENS



The Byron Museum is pleased to announce the unveiling of its new exhibit, Byron: Open for Business 1835-1975 on 10th. This March new permanent exhibit focuses on local businesses through the years, starting with Byron's early beginnings up to 1975. The histories of several

businesses are featured including Gill's Hall, Dixson's Department Store, Byron Cheese Factory, and the once popular Clamming Industry along the Rock River.

Several of the objects on display include a sign from Piper's Hardware, a block of old Post Office boxes, a cabinet from the Barrick and Hunter store, and an old safe from the Byron Bank. Visitors are given the opportunity to test their local knowledge against our Byron Business Trivia and are encouraged to share their favorite business memories, past or present.

In conjunction with the exhibit's unveiling, the Byron Museum hosted the program, *A Visit with Mrs. Potts*. Mrs. Potts was performed in first person by Ellie Carlson, Curator of Costumes for the Winnetka Historical Society. The

historic Mrs. Potts invented the coldhandled sad iron. Mrs. Potts stopped by the Byron Museum to promote her invention and discuss the technology behind her product, and what it meant for a woman to hold a US Patent and manage her own affairs. The audience was delighted with Mrs. Carlson's portrayal of Mrs. Potts and her knowledge of the era.
