COLLECTION NEWS

Abraham Lincoln Hood Ornament

This item, recently donated to the museum, is one of only 300 known to be made around 1927. It was meant to be a hood ornament for a car, and would be mounted on the radiator cap. It is nickel-plated and about 6" tall. The underside is embossed with the words "L.T. Barrick, Byron, Illinois."

L.T. Barrick (1878-1950) was a grandson of early Byron Township settlers. He was a pharmacist and merchant on Byron's Main Street for 42 years. He purchased his pharmacy (Barrick's Drug Store) from E.E. Evans in 1895 and sold it in 1914. He also



owned the Barrick and Hunter clothing store on the corner of 2nd Street where Dixson's Department Store was located.

Antique Appraisal

THE HIDDEN HISTORY OF THE RAILROADS OF ILLINOIS

August 12th at 6pm

In 1910, Byron was bustling with activity, including the coming and going of trains. Train whistles tooted, great steam engines shot plumes of smoke into the air, and passenger and freight trains moved to and from the depots.

Paying tribute to Byron's railroad past, the Byron Museum will host the FREE program *Crossroads of the Nation: The Hidden History of the Railroads of Illinois* on Thursday, August 12th at 6:00pm. Simon Cordery, railroad historian and historical advisor to the National Railroad Hall of Fame, will give a fascinating look at the expansion of the railroad industry in the Land of Lincoln, and demonstrate how the Prairie State fits into the pattern of national railroad development, while exploring the national political significance of the history of railroads in Illinois. Byron Cemetery Walk

Saturday, May 15th was an eventful day at the Byron Cemetery on 5th Street. Over 35 people attended the Byron Library's first Cemetery Walk. The Byron Library, with the assistance of the Byron Museum, studied the lives of several of Byron's early settlers and

prominent citizens. Picture of Bakener Funeral Home from 1931-1955. This building was erected in 1839 as Byron's 1st hotel and was called the Pacific House Hotel. Built by Samuel and Dudley Wood. Stood on Corner of Union and Blackhawk Drive. It has since been torn down. Written on the back: "This building was erected in 1839 as Byron's first hotel and was called the Pacific House. Built by Samuel and Dudley Wood, it stood on the corner of Union Street and Blackhawk Drive and was last used as a funeral home by Orville F. Bakener from 1931 until 1955.
